# Diwali, the Festival of Light

The children displayed the work they did in connection with Diwali, the festival of light. They learned that Diwali is celebrated between

oil is to represent the triumph of good over evil. Lamps are kept burning during the night so that the god Lakshmi feels welcome. Firecrackers are burst to drive out evil spirits.

#### Islam and Mendhi hands



Infants classes also did work on Islam. We can see a photo of their Mendhi hands. They learned that Muslims pray five times a day and that they face towards Mecca.

#### The Crocus Project

The Holocaust Educational Project is intended for pupils aged eleven and upwards. The Holocaust Educational Trust of Ireland provides schools with yellow crocus bulbs to plant in autumn in memory of the one and a half million Jewish chil-

dren and thousands of other children who died in he Holocaust.

The yellow flowers recall the yellow Stars of David all Jews were forced to wear under Nazi rule.

The activity provides an opportunity to introduce primary school children to the subject of Holocaust. 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> class children in Denis's class are taking part in this project as part of the Equality and Justice strand of the Ethical Education programme.





## The Big Clean-Up

Some parents, children and our German visitors took time out of a weekend in September to clean up the school garden, which had gone wild after the long summer.

John Walker, Chairperson of the Parents Association, hired a strimmers and we all set to weeding the vegetable beds.

## Busy Bees around the Garden

The children have been busy in the school garden this term.

3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Class planted a willow dome with help from parents John Walker and Roslyn O'Connell.



1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Class spread sea weed on the vegetable beds to fertilise the soil which is being prepared for planting in Spring time.

Each class now brings their left over fruit and vegetables after lunch to the compost bin so that we can make our own compost.

Every pupil planted a variety of bulbs around the school to encourage unity and respect and we can all look forward to the added colour next Spring.

#### Geography Field Trip to LEE Strand Creamery

Third and Fourth Class went on a trip to the Lee Strand Creamery in September. We got a tour of the



production area. We saw where the milk was pasteurised and where it was put into cartons and bottles. We also got to go into the Lab where the milk is tested for bacteria and we met the mascot, Mighty Mikey.

In the end we went into the boardroom where we were shown how to make delicious strawberry and banana smoothies. We all got a goodie bag to take home, with a mug, a key ring and free milk. We'd a great day. Our school is now going to collect tokens from the Lee Strand milk cartons. If we collect enough tokens, Lee Strand will give the school some money.

#### Science Week in Action

Third and Fourth Class did some interesting experiments during Science Week

We did an experiment called Rainbow Milk where we used food colouring, a cotton bud and washing up liquid to break the bond that holds the fats in milk together. We could see the fats twist and turn in the milk.

We also did Amazing Triangles using cocktail sticks and marshmallows.

We found out that the triangle is a much stronger shape than a square. This makes the triangle a popular shape when building.

We were honoured to have Grace O'Donnell,


Mayor of Tralee to assist with the count. She shared stories of her personal election experience with the children.
